To stop this pandemic, we need to use all our prevention tools. Vaccines are one of the most effective ways to protect your health and prevent disease. Vaccines work with your body's natural defenses so your body will be ready to fight the virus if you are exposed (also called "immunity").

#### WHAT TO DO NOW

• Complete the above survey. You will receive communication inviting you to one of the available opportunities, when vaccine supply is available.

#### HOW TO BE READY WHEN IT'S YOUR TURN

- Complete the pre-registration form found **here**.
- $\bullet \ Bring \ appointment \ invite \ and \ the \ pre-registration form \ to \ your \ scheduled \ vaccine \ opportunity.$

#### WHAT TO EXPECT

- The most common side effects are pain in the arm where you got the shot, feeling tired, headache, body aches, chills, and fever.
- Public Health will follow-up with you when the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose is available.
- The vaccine used will be based on supply access.
- If you have had an anaphylactic reaction to anything in the past, do not attend a mass vaccine clinic.
- If you have COVID-19, you can be vaccinated when your isolation ends, but because there is limited number of vaccines, Public Health asks that you wait 90 days after recovering from COVID-19 to get a vaccine.
- If you have received any vaccination, you must wait 2 weeks before receiving the COVID-19 vaccine.
- You will still need to wear a mask and socially distance after getting each shot of the vaccine for now.
